

News From the Park

For the first time since the House of Happy Walls Museum renovation in 2018, Jack London Park Partners will host a special art exhibition featuring artist Tilden Daken. Daken, known as the "Painter of the Valley of the Moon" was a friend and fellow adventurer of Jack London. The exhibition, originated by the Museum of Sonoma County (MSC), will travel to Jack London State Historic Park (JLSHP) from Santa Rosa, where it is currently on display through March 31st. The JLSHP exhibit is scheduled to open on April 20th.

The show is supported and inspired by Tilden Daken's granddaughter, Bonnie Portnoy, and the Jack London State Historic Park version will be curated by Jennifer Bethke, collections specialist at the Museum of Sonoma County. We are beyond excited to be partnering with MSC and our good friend and Park supporter, Bonnie Portnoy.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Our tireless efforts and advocacy for the return of Transcendence Theatre Company (TTC) to Jack London State Historic Park for the summer of 2024 have not yielded the outcome we all were hoping for. Sadly, we are facing the same circumstances as we did last season and TTC will not present their iconic summertime shows at the Park.

We remain in transition as we continue to work with State Parks to comply with the 2022 court order resulting from a lawsuit brought by the California State Park Rangers Association (CSPRA). Our new goal is to secure a permit from State Parks for the summer of 2025.

Thankfully, the resilient and irrepressible TTC leadership has found an alternative venue in Sonoma at the Field of Dreams. We're beyond grateful that Transcendence Theatre Company can continue to provide their world class performances in Sonoma Valley. Phew!

In the meantime, this leaves JLPP with a sizeable gap, once again, in our operating budget. Unlike last year, we have had more time to prepare for the loss in income and have a strategy to make it up to avoid any disruption to staffing and Park programming.

There is no denying that this is a significant setback, however, we remain optimistic and will forge ahead with our mission, "To rigorously protect the historic and natural character of the Park while creating inclusive opportunities for education, recreation, discovery, and joy, leaving future generations a Park that would make Jack London proud".

Thank you to all of our Park supporters for hanging in there with us.

LEGACY OF LONDON

In honor of Jack London's 148th birthday on January 12, 2024, Park volunteers, staff and fans gathered at the Jack London Saloon in Glen Ellen to toast the famous author and for a special viewing of London's 1902 Bar Lock #10 typewriter.

Many experienced a moment of awe realizing it was on this typewriter that London produced so many of his greatest works. The typewriter was on display courtesy of Darius Anderson who recently purchased it, and will be housed in his private collection. Anderson, a lifelong collector of London ephemera is a local developer, lobbyist, political strategist, investor and Managing Partner of Sonoma Media Investments.

The typewriter had been away from Glen Ellen for decades and had a long journey home. It was first acquired by Waring Jones, a writer and collector of American Authors. It was then sold to Steve Soboroff, a Los Angeles philanthropist who assembled a world class collection of typewriters owned by great authors and famous people. Anderson, who had been searching for this typewriter for over 30 years, recently acquired it when the Soboroff collection went up for auction. "It is great to have it back home in Glen Ellen" he said.

INTERVIEW WITH STEWART HUME WITH ELISA STANCIL LEVINE

Stewart Hume shares memories of the Guest Ranch from his childhood, as told to Elisa Stancil Levine in February, 2024. Stewart is now 90 years old and his first work as a docent was as a teen at the cottage in the late 1940's! Stewart recently retired as a cottage docent. In this two part series he recalls experiences that bring the Guest Ranch to life.

I was a young child in 1938, during the early Guest Ranch days, only 3 or 4 years old. You see, my aunt was a nurse in the Army during WW1 and a founding member of the American Legion Auxiliary. An early instigator of this important group was Eliza London Shepard, who was very dynamic, very involved, and a bonus lawyer for veterans of the war. In fact, my mother and aunt joined Eliza in France when she traveled there as National President of the Auxiliary. Eliza died when I was six years old, so my memories of her are not as vivid as those of Irving (her son) and Mildred (Irving's wife) who were like extra parents to me.

My father was in poor health ever since serving in WW1, so though he came to the ranch two or three times, he died at the age of 54, when I was only 12. This was a horrible blow.

Monrovia is where I went to school all year, and in the late thirties, before and during the war, there was gas rationing. My mother had a C sticker, allowing her to get more gas, because she was a teacher and three other teachers car pooled to school with her. To get to the ranch you have to realize the roads were not freeways back then! It took all day to drive

from Monrovia to San Luis Obispo, where we spent the night. The next day we drove to San Francisco, caught the ferry to Sausalito, then on to Glen Ellen.

There was a long, winding, dirt road with blind curves, starting from a lower portion of London Ranch Road, about 1/3 mile up. You had to honk your horn on every corner because no one could see you coming. All through the guest ranch days it was like that, people loved it, it was an adventure.

By the 30's and 40's there was serious smog all through the Los Angeles area, caused by steel and other heavy manufacturing. So the fresh air every summer in Glen Ellen was glorious. We used to take deep breaths when we got out of the car, breathing in the clear air...and the sky was so blue! Whenever we came to the ranch we were welcomed with open arms.

Beauty Ranch was where I learned to ride "Western" and went swimming, rowing, and canoeing on the lake. Various family gatherings took place at the lake and Olympic swimmer Ernie Smith helped me perfect Australian crawl. There were horses at the ranch and some guests brought their own horses for a month or more. Back then there was a trail called the "Up and Down Trail" from the Wolf House up to the lake, and I recall a very steep drop off along part of it, and of course now it is all overgrown after all these years. Just remember, there was a HUGE view from the Wolf House back then.

We usually stayed in the Carriage House rooms, there were a lot of guest rooms in there. Once or twice as a teen I got to stay in a room in the Cottage, the one with the fireplace. I thought that was so cool!

No one had a fireplace in a bedroom in Southern California, of course, it was warmer there.

When I was coming here back then I read *Call of the Wild.* And then later I read *White Fang*, and thought it was a much better book, and I told Irving right away, "This is a much better book than *Call of the Wild.*" And he said "Yes, that's what Jack thought too." Years later, in an auction house in SF, I saw where Jack had inscribed this same thought, in a first edition of *White Fang*. I was an English major, so I knew a little about style and how to write, and it was nice to see my impression confirmed.

I never read Little Lady of the Big House, and The Valley of the Moon I never finished. But Burning Daylight had scenes that could be set right here, a very interesting book. And of course I loved Sea Wolf and Martin Eden.

It took many years to build the House of Happy Walls, maybe 12? There were a lot of costs and delays. Charmian was working so hard to have this mansion and the first time I saw it I said "I want a house just like this." And totally fireproof, as much as anyone could imagine. Steel window frames and doors, tile roof, stone walls. The ceilings were so interesting, fascinating stuff. I actually had lunch alone there with Charmian one day, when I was about fourteen!

In the next Moonletter, Stewart will share more memories and impressions from the 1940's up until today.

Here is a favorite recipe from Guest Ranch days, Mildred made scores of casseroles and froze them so there would be plenty for unexpected guests. Stewart Hume gave me this recipe!

"MORE" casserole - a London Ranch special from Mildred Shepard's kitchen
Sauce: Brown a good sized onion and bell pepper (chopped) with a clove of garlic if desired.
Saute one pound ground sirloin, combine with onions and peppers.
Add 4 cans of tomato sauce, mix well, then add:
chopped parsley, Worcestershire sauce, thyme, rosemary, salt and pepper
Stir, allow to cool, set aside
Base:
Arrange in baking dish:
1 can corn, 1 can string beans, 1 can peas and 1 medium can of black olives
1 small can of each: pimentos, mushrooms
1 cup grated Tillamook cheese
1 cup cooked and drained spaghetti, cooked until tender
Pour sauce over base and bake at 500 degrees for half hour, reduce to 350 degrees and
sprinkle more grated cheese on the top, bake for half hour until cheese is browned.

THE STORY OF THE MUSEUM LONGBOARD BY BOBBY BRINTON





My name is Bobby Brinton. This is my story on building the redwood longboard for the Jack London Park's House of Happy Walls museum.

A few years ago when my mother, Gerry Brinton, was still serving on the Jack London Park Partners Board she mentioned that there were plans for reviving the House of Happy Walls by adding displays that would highlight some of Jack and Charmian's travels. It has been documented that Jack had spent time in the Hawaiian islands in the South Pacific learning to surf on traditional redwood plank surfboards like the locals would have used during that era. The museum had the idea of displaying a wood surfboard similar to the board style that Jack London would've used while visiting Hawaii. My mom asked if I had interest in pursuing a project like this and I immediately said yes! I've spent a good portion of my childhood in Jack London State Park. It is a very special place for me and my family, and anything I can do to help contribute to the beauty and education of the park is something I want to be a part of.

I have a close friend, Xavier Lanier, who is a wood board builder and collector. He was given a traditional redwood plank surfboard that was found in a crawl space in a house he was helping a client with. There was no written history on the board, only a hand painted Hawaiian royal family crest on the top. Judging by the age of the wood, the outline of the shape and the profile of the rails, Xavier and a few experienced friends in the surf world estimated that this board was an original redwood plank from the early 1930-40's surfing era. Xavier happened to bring this board to my workshop one day for me to check out. The timing could not have been any better!

I began to get very excited about the project of creating this replica board that Jack London would have rode during his time in the Pacific Islands. In my personal lumber collection I found a second or third growth redwood piece that had the length and width to accommodate a traditional redwood plank style surfboard. The tree the slab came from was originally an old growth redwood that had fallen on Xavier's family property in the Russian River area.

He and I put together a template based off his historic Hawaiian redwood plank board from his collection. We stretch the template out to be a little bit longer to make a 10 foot board. We prepped the slab and then cut out the outline on the slab. Once we had an outline of the board on the slab, I began the shaping process.

As I slowly began planing away and shaving off wood, the board began to take life. I made sure to take my time with this piece. For me, working in short increments spread out over time helps me to really see and find the perfect shape for a board. It took several months, working and then walking away in order to come back to it with fresh eyes until I finally came to a point when I felt the board was at its best shape. From there, I applied multiple coats of marine varnish to seal the redwood timber and it was ready.

Before delivering the board, I was aching to have a shot to try and surf it before handing it over. I took it to Ocean Beach in San Francisco and went for a paddle. One wave was surfed and let me tell you it was a very humbling experience! Surfing a solid redwood plank weighing more than 70 pounds is no small endeavor. Many people on the beach thought I was nuts and asked about the story of this board.

I feel this is the best board I have ever built and it was an experience I will never forget. I am honored to have it in the House of Happy Walls and hope it will be there for a long time to help share the story of Jack's adventures and surf history.

EDUCATION PROGRAMS UPDATE

The education team has kicked of a full spring schedule with 48 field trips and school programs sessions booked for January through May. The programs serving our visiting schools include Adventures in Writing for 4th and 5th grade, Nature's Design Ecology for 7th grade, and our traditional school tours and self-guided school groups for all grade levels. We are looking forward to an exciting school season at the Park!
