From the Executive Director

Someone asked me recently if working at the Park everyday makes it feel less magical or even commonplace. The answer is, of course, no. One reason for that is that, on most days, I get to experience the Park through the eyes of a first-time visitor. One day it will be from the perspective of a retired couple on holiday from Bern, Switzerland. On another, it's from a multigenerational family traveling from Beijing. Often, it's a Bay Area native who never knew this Park existed. And on any given day it's like working at the UN walking around the museum. In the bookshop you might hear Russian spoken and then a quick trip upstairs you hear French. Then, headed to a meeting at the cottage you wonder if that accent you heard coming from the picnic tables was Australian or New Zealand. In any case, it's safe to say that it's pretty international around here.

Today, as I start to see subtle signs of summer giving way to fall, it occurs to me that there is no better time to experience the beauty of the Park over the next couple of months. Will the early harvest mean the vines start their journey toward a fiery red display? Will we get an early sprinkle to dampen earth?

Fall really does bring its own magic to the Park. The golden light filtering through the oak woodlands, the changing colors of Sonoma Mountain, crisp mornings and expansive views across Sonoma Valley make this one of my favorite seasons here. Plus, there's a robust schedule of new programs and offerings at the Park starting in September.

Summer is here and Autumn is Coming

We're two-thirds of the way through the year, and what a season it has been. Summer is beginning to wind down, fall is just around the corner, and there is plenty happening with Rutas y Aventuras as we move into the changing season.

August gave us a welcome chance to escape the heat beneath the cool shade of the redwoods. Together, we followed these towering giants through the forest to the Ancient Redwood, taking in the beauty and history of one of the park's most remarkable landscapes.

On **September 5**, we'll head to the south side of the park for an early-morning hike that begins among the historic buildings of the Sonoma Developmental Center and winds its way around Fern Lake. Along the way, we'll explore the rich history of this area while observing how the ecosystem responds to the last warm days of summer and prepares for the transition into fall.

We also have another exciting outing planned for September. On **September 12**, Positive Images and Feminist Bird Club will join Jack London State Historic Park for a Bilingual Birding Outing. Together, we'll spend the morning discovering the birds that call the park home, listening for their songs and watching for movement among the trees, fields, and skies.

October is shaping up to be an exciting month, with three unique programs on the calendar.

We'll kick things off with a series of hikes in collaboration with Sugarloaf Ridge State Park. Keep an eye on the *Rutas y Aventuras* page for details as we get closer to the event dates.

We're also bringing back one of our most popular programs: our after-hours evening **Bat Watch**. We'll begin by exploring some of the stories, legends, and history of the park before turning our attention to the fascinating crepuscular residents of Sonoma Valley.

As dusk settles in, we'll gather near the ranch's bat box to watch hundreds of bats emerge into the evening sky on their nightly hunt for insects. It's a remarkable sight, and after the enthusiastic response we received last year, we knew we had to bring it back. Join us on **Friday, October 23, or Friday, October 30**, the night before Halloween, for this unforgettable autumn experience



One Last Community Day for 2026

Speaking of holidays, it's also time for the final *Rutas y Aventuras* Community Day of the year!

On Sunday, October 25, we'll be celebrating with a **Día de los Muertos** theme and plenty for families to enjoy. Morning hikes, birds, history, evening walks, bats, Día de los Muertos, Halloween. There's something for everyone this fall. So, which adventures will you choose?

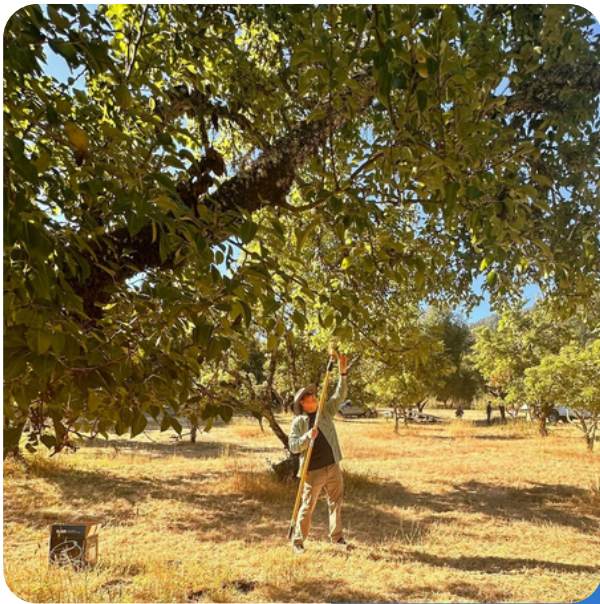

ORCHARD HARVEST 2026

2026 turned out to be another remarkable year for the Historic Orchard at Jack London Park. Planted more than 100 years ago by the Sonoma Developmental Center (then known as the Sonoma State Home), the orchards now encompass approximately 35 acres of prune and European plum, apricot, cherry, peach, apple, pear, and quince trees. Since 2015, Jack London Park Partners has been working to restore and revitalize this historic landscape.

In 2021, JLPP partnered with the nonprofit Farm to Pantry to ensure that fruit harvested from the orchard reaches members of our community facing food insecurity. This year, we donated approximately 500 pounds of prune plums and 1,500 pounds of pears, bringing the project's total contribution to nearly **17,000 pounds of fresh fruit** since the partnership began. That's the equivalent of approximately **68,000 servings of food**.

This year's harvest was made possible through the efforts of our dedicated Orchard, Park, and Trail Maintenance volunteers, along with support from our docents, Board of Directors, Charmian's Circle members, and the Rotary Club of Sonoma Valley. Harvesting and distributing thousands of pounds of fruit would be a tremendous challenge without the support of these volunteers. We extend our heartfelt thanks to everyone who lent a hand and helped make this year's harvest such a success.

VOLUNTEER ENRICHMENT



On August 12, thirteen volunteers gathered at the Park for a special enrichment training, The Redwood Experience, led by volunteer and California Naturalist Laura Wagner. The day blended hiking, scientific discovery, sensory exploration, and moments of quiet mindfulness—offering participants a chance to connect more deeply with the natural world.

The group made their way to the Park's only ancient redwood, a 2,000-year-old giant standing proudly on Sonoma Mountain. Along the moderately paced 4+ mile hike, with 620 feet of elevation gain, volunteers paused for guided “experiences” that invited them to engage with the forest through touch, scent, sound, and sight. These activities helped everyone slow down, tune in, and feel the restorative energy of the redwood ecosystem.

The enrichment concluded with a peaceful, guided meditation beneath the redwoods, followed by a silent walk through the fairy ring forest—an unforgettable way to end the journey.

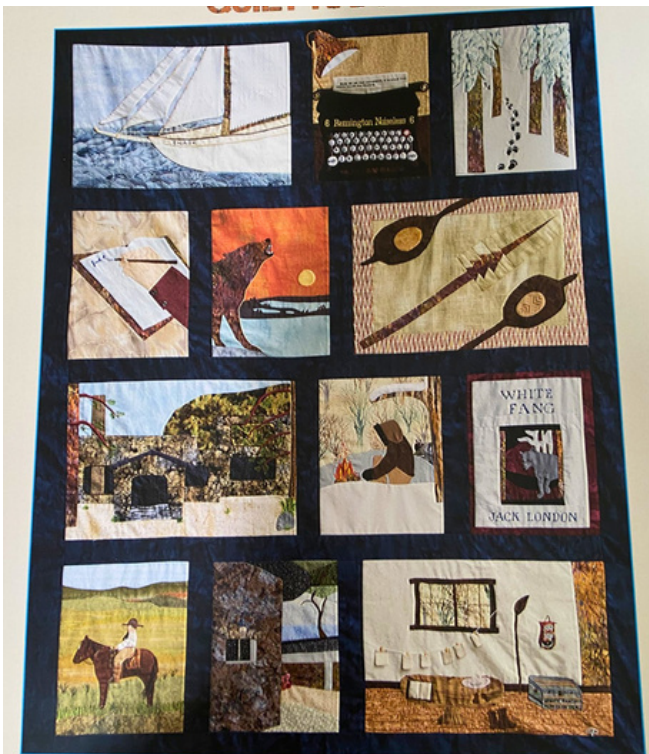
FROM THE VOLUNTEER COUNCIL

FROM CALIFORNIA STATE PARKS

BioBlitz for California Biodiversity Day 2026

What is the Sonoma Developmental Center Open Space (SDCOS)? What species call it home? Let's explore together! Come celebrate California Biodiversity Day at one of the Bay Area's newest California State Park properties. Participants will have the opportunity to mingle with state parks staff, contribute to citizen science efforts, and help us develop a species list for our newest property!

Meet at the intersection of Harney and Railroad at 10 AM on Saturday, September 12th and from there, we will walk up to the peak of Lake Suttonfield where the activity will begin. You will need a smartphone with the iNaturalist app installed (or you can use a camera and upload it to iNaturalist on your home computer afterward). Please wear good walking shoes/boots and bring water and snacks. We will make observations of any plants and animals we see, including signs of life such as nests, scat, or tracks. WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS

There are a couple of apps that you should add to your phone now to prepare. Watch Duty will alert you when fires occur, how they are spreading, and whether you must evacuate.

FireSign AI will help you prepare your family, your home and defensible space BEFORE a fire, reducing the chance that you and your family will be impacted. When you download FireSign AI on either Apple or Android, you will be able to create a personalized readiness score with specific recommendations. It allows you to create a unique escape plan based on your family's needs, and a secure, encrypted document vault for critical documents, like home inventories, insurance documents and IDs. There's even an e-store, where you can buy customized go bags and accessories. And it's free for the first 60 days with no obligation.

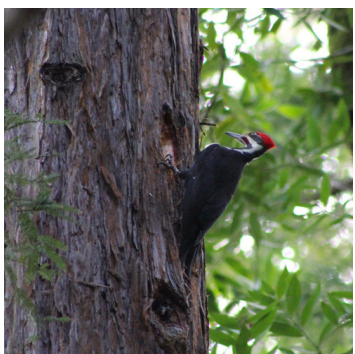

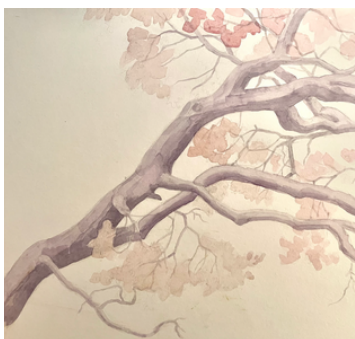
